## Final Comments & Questions

Since I never actually supervised the text submitted, I had no chance to influence its content. Had the student approached me at least once before having the work printed and bound, I would have told her e.g. the following:

1) The chapter on social context is largely irrelevant to the topic

2) The biographical chapter is also too long in proportion to the whole work

3) The thesis as a whole is mainly factual, consisting of data taken over from secondary sources – undoubtedly interesting, but hardly a material to be developed in an original critical way in a bachelor thesis.

4) Passages dealing with the novels contain a good deal of re-telling of the plot, *Tess* is dealt with only in two pages, of which only about two paragraphs deal with the topic.

5) Last but not least ... despite all the effort ... the thesis has only 26 pages text ... which contain hardly enough material for an essay.

6) One of the few worthy comments is the one on the sheep- bathing scene in *FftMC*... this is how to approach the theme ... Start with "there are many scenes similar to this one occurring in the novel...." and explore them ...

As a whole, the thesis surely has some merits, but clearly not those, which are expected from a BA thesis according to the present grading criteria.
